



Modern Standard Arabic for Beginners Part I

This course syllabus and description applies to the 2023 fall semester.

General Information

This is an Arabic language course offered by the Centre for Advanced Middle Eastern Studies (CMES) exclusively for Lund University staff and students interested in working and conducting research in Arabic speaking countries.

- *Language of instruction:* English
- *Credits:* no credits will be awarded. Participants will receive a certificate upon completion of the course.
- *Course fee:* the course is free of charge for participants

This 12-week course in Modern Standard Arabic (Basic User, level A1) is offered during the fall semester of 2023. The participants will *either* participate in classes on Mondays (13:15-15:00) *or* on Thursdays (10:15-12:00) at CMES.

Course Content

The course provides practical linguistic knowledge and cultural background for students and staff who want to study Arabic for work, fieldwork and/or research purposes. Participants will learn to read and write basic Arabic and be able to use the language in everyday situations. In addition to an introduction to Modern Standard Arabic, participants will also get insights into cultures and traditions of the Arabic speaking world. The course is based on a combination of lectures, individual studies and seminars.

Learning Outcomes

On completion of the course, students shall be able to:

- understand and use familiar everyday expressions and very basic phrases
- introduce themselves and others
- ask and answer short questions about personal details

Entry Requirements

To be eligible for the course, participants must either be employed at Lund University or enrolled as a student at Lund University. No previous knowledge of Arabic is required.

Application Procedure

Participants should apply to attend the course by sending an email to info@cme.lu.se no later than Wednesday September 6, 2023. Please write “A1 Arabic Course” in the subject line and include the following information:

- full name;
- reason for applying (e.g., fieldwork, research, internship);
- preferred day to attend classes (Mondays or Thursdays); and
- if you are employed at LU, please include your LUCAT id. If you are a student at LU, please include your date of birth.

If your application is successful, you will receive additional information before the course commences.

Course Coordinator

The course is taught and coordinated by Rafah Barhoum, language training expert at CMES. Rafah is specialized in teaching Arabic for non-native speakers, focusing on methods and theories on teaching Arabic as a second language. She has previously taught Modern Standard Arabic at LU’s Centre for Languages and Literature and worked as a supervisor teacher of Modern Standard Arabic at the Higher Language Institute at Damascus University. Her teaching approach builds on using authentic materials, involving culture, providing opportunities for lived experiences outside the classroom and building on the students’ motivation for using the language. Schedule

Date	Class Content
11 Sep./14 Sep.	<i>Class 1:</i> An introduction to the Arabic language and alphabet. Learning to greet people. Modern Standard Arabic vs. Spoken Arabic, the different spoken varieties.
18 Sep./21 Sep.	<i>Class 2:</i> Arabic letters and sounds.
25 Sep./28 Sep.	<i>Class 3:</i> An interactive class with Arabic letters and sounds. Use of Al Jazeera videos. Arabic script.
2 Oct./5 Oct.	<i>Class 4:</i> Arabic script, the written system, long vowels and ḥarakāt. Identifying short and long vowels through words and matching pictures.
9 Oct./12 Oct.	<i>Class 5:</i> Practicing how to connect Arabic letters and making words. Additional diacritical marks – the sukūn, the tanween, the maddah (~), the shadda (ˆ), and the hamzah (ء). Identifying additional diacritical marks through words and pictures.
16 Oct./19 Oct.	<i>Class 6:</i> Culture: meeting people, shaking hands and introducing yourself. Practicing letters that are similar in shape

and the sounds of letters that are similar in pronunciation.
Practicing the alphabet and vocabulary through reading.
Exercises: connecting letters.

- 23 Oct./26 Oct. *Class 7:* Practicing the definite article (al, ال) through words and reading. Definite and indefinite nouns. Masculine and feminine words. Practicing professions.
- 30 Oct./2 Nov. *Class 8:* Grammar and subject pronouns. An interactive class.
- 6 Nov./9 Nov. *Class 9:* Grammar and possessive pronouns. Body parts.
- 13 Nov./16 Nov. *Class 10:* Verb conjugations and past tense. Group conversations. Days of the week. Literature: Bader 2010.
- 20 Nov./23 Nov. *Class 11:* Verb conjugations and present tense. Group conversation: practicing verb conjugation. Arabic numerals.
- 27 Nov./30 Nov. *Class 12:* Arabic question words. Negation in Arabic. Group conversations. Literature: Bader 2010, pp. 224-227.
